
Aim

Promote individualised and consistent evidence-based neuroprotective practice in IFCDC for premature born and sick infants, and neonates across neonatal settings with a focus on 5 of the 7 Core Measures of Neuroprotective Family-Centred Developmental Care:

- 1. Healing environment
- 2. Partnering with families
- 3. Positioning and handling
- 4. Safeguarding sleep
- 5. Minimizing stress and pain
